FY 2022 Byrne Justice Assistance Grant (Byrne JAG) Program

Background

The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program was created as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2005. The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) is seeking applications for the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program. This program furthers the Department's mission by assisting state, local, and tribal efforts to prevent or reduce crime and violence. https://www.bja.gov/Jag/.

The BJA solicitation requires that the application be made available for review by the applicant's governing body, or organization designated by the governing body, before the submission of the application.

FY22 Funding Available

Total: \$1,521,591 (Administration: \$152,159 and sub-grants: \$1,369,432). Byrne JAG awards are four-year awards.

The allocation is formula-based on population and the UCR Part 1 violent crime data. Allocation includes ten percent administration funds for the State Administering Agency (SAA), Office of Victim Services and Justice Grants (OVSJG).

Funds must be used in the identified purpose areas:

- (1) Law Enforcement
- (2) Prosecution and Courts
- (3) Crime Prevention and Education
- (4) Corrections and Community Corrections
- (5) Drug Treatment and Enforcement
- (6) Planning, Evaluation, and Technology Improvement
- (7) Crime Victim and Witness Programs (other than Compensation)
- (8) Mental Health Programs and Services

Application

OVSJG is proposing to provide \$1,369,432 in sub-awards for two of the purpose areas as allowed under the Byrne JAG solicitation:

- Community Corrections (specifically reentry services)
- Planning, Evaluation, and Technology Improvement

The priorities areas for the District are based upon stakeholder feedback, grantee data collection specific to gaps and barriers, and results of a stakeholder survey conducted in 2021. OVSJG anticipates making subawards for 60 percent of the funds to community-based organizations and 40 percent to District agencies. OVSJG, in turn, released a Request for Application (RFA) for community-based organizations and District agencies to apply under the FY 2023 Justice Grants Consolidated RFA. Preliminary funding decisions are anticipated in early September.
